

# The Vintage Restoration Blueprint:

This template is a **Deconstruction Engine** for collectors who have found a "project watch" and need to move from a bag of parts to a ticking heirloom without losing their sanity or budget.

---

## ◆ **1 Phase 1: The Project Charter (Definition of Done)**

Before a single screw is turned, you must define the finish line.

- **Definition of Done:** "A fully serviced, authenticated 1965 Seiko 62MAS with original dial/hands, passing a 3-bar pressure test, and regulated to within +/- 10 seconds per day."
  - **The North Star:** If a part cannot be found that maintains this "Originality" standard, the project is paused.

## ◆ **2 Phase 2: Deconstruction into Linear Phases**

We break the chaos into four manageable chapters.

- **Phase 1: Forensic Discovery** (Authentication and part-sourcing).
  - **Phase 2: Component Procurement** (Hunting for New Old Stock - NOS parts).
  - **Phase 3: The Technical Build** (Movement service and case refinishing).
  - **Phase 4: Quality Assurance** (Time-keeping observation and pressure testing).

## ◆ **3 Phase 3: Actionable Task Checklist**

Each phase is powered by verb-based commands.

### **Phase 1: Forensic Discovery**

- [ ] **Photograph** every angle of the watch before disassembly.
- [ ] **Verify** serial numbers against the manufacturer's database.
- [ ] **Document** all missing or damaged parts (e.g., chipped crystal, rusted hairspring).

### **Phase 2: Component Procurement**

- [ ] **Search** eBay and forums for "NOS" replacement gaskets.
  - [ ] **Acquire** a period-correct handset if the current ones are corroded.
